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
THE GREAT MICHIGAN READ

Arc of Justice tells the story of African American physician Ossian Sweet and the chain of events that occurred after he purchased a home for his family in an allwhite Detroit neighborhood in 1925. A masterpiece of historical research, the book reads like an epic legal thriller.

By telling the story of Dr. Ossian Sweet, author Kevin Boyle, a Detroit native, illuminates other historical issues, including the building blocks of the Civil Rights movement, the Great Migration of African Americans to the North, and the boomtown years of Detroit. "When you think about civil rights and race





FROM THE DIRECTOR:

'Bye Mr. Jim

Tuesday, February 10, 1998 was a momentous day in Hackley Public Library history, because that was the day that James C. Horan started his tenure as Children's Librarian, and things have never been the same after that. On August 31, 2011, beloved "Mr. Jim" retired.

The day Jim started it at Hackley Library it was snowing -- of course. Though we'd tried to get the work completed before he came to town, the Youth Services department was completely torn up because we were putting in new wires for children's computers. In what we learned was his unflappable way, Jim stepped over the loose nails and around the cables, ignored the noise and the dust, and started making arrangements for a story time on Saturday when the electricians wouldn't be working.

I was a little worried that we wouldn't be able to keep a fellow of Jim's caliber here, especially when his first day was rocky. Before coming here he served as the Youth Services Coordinator for the Monroe (MI) County Library system, where he coordinated children's activities in 15 branch libraries. Other stops in his distinguished career include public libraries in West Virginia, Massachusetts, Illinois, and Washington state and he was a classroom teacher in Detroit.

Then I learned that in planning to move from Monroe, on Lake Erie, to Muskegon, he'd made arrangements to move his boat here before he found a place for himself to live. We'd hooked him. There are lots of good public libraries, but Lake Erie just can't compete with Lake Michigan.

While here at the Hackley Library, Horan has been very busy. He's brought creative writing, manga drawing, birds and reptiles, reading dogs, the kids flea market, family rock and roll parties on the lawn, steel drums in January when we needed them most, llamas, a steam powered cider making engine, a horse, and even a street sweeper to kids. Most

importantly, he brought a boundless love of books and reading to thousands.

Horan plans to stay in Muskegon after retirement, spending more time on his boat and more time with wife Linda as well as visiting family, including his three grown children.

Those wishing to make a donation in honor of Horan on his retirement are asked to consider the Muskegon Public Schools Scholarship Fund at the Community Foundation for Muskegon County for Muskegon High School graduates. Scholarship recipients are selected by teachers and counselors at the high school who really know the students.

Canoeing and Kayaking in Michigan with Doc Fletcher. 6:00 PM Tuesday, November 1



As of August 20, we were 92% of the way towards making our goal of \$1,100,000. If you've already pledged or donated --- thank you! When the project is completed, your name will be on the wall by the front door listing all our generous supporters (no matter the size of your gift).

Summer is wrapping up, and that means the family history workshops presented by the Muskegon County Genealogical Society are starting up again. Everyone is welcome, from those just starting out who might feel a bit lost to seasoned veterans who've hit a brick wall in their research. Did you know that the Local History & Genealogy department has Muskegon newspapers on microfilm? The Muskegon Chronicle has been the dominant newspaper for decades, but we also have various early newspapers, dating all the way back to the *Muskegon Journal* of 1857! Also, vital statistics reported in the Muskegon Chronicle have been fully indexed from 1980 to 2010. Each year's index includes births, deaths, marriages, divorces, obituaries, and even anniversaries! A big thanks to Matt Burns for compiling these indexes and donating copies to the Department!
